School uniforms

Forest Schools with Mrs Leyland (Big Class)

The Big Class continued to develop their problem solving skills, resilience and confidence as well as developing strong, positive relationships with others within their natural surroundings. They practise knot tying which they

accessed to make tents and hammocks. They extended and celebrated their learning by making a fire and baking pizzas.



Forest Schools with Mrs Leyland (Wee Class)

The children learnt how to tie a knot around a tree and built shelters using ropes and tarpaulins. They also played some new games. There was also tree climbing, swinging on buoys and plenty of sunshine! They learned about the fire safety when trying to light a flint safely.


Open the Book with ExP



This term the children have been exploring the season of Spring. We have taken part in nature walks to look for signs of Spring and the children used a checklist to collect data and discovered, daffodils, buds, lambs and insects. They created their own

daffodil art and caterpillars. A child in our ELC has a beautiful cherry

blossom tree in their garden and we visited the tree to look for any changes. The children are going to follow the season by continuing to monitor the tree.





This term we have focussed on our ELC values, Happiness, Respect and Ambition. The children were able to explain what makes them happy and how we show respect to others. The children demonstrated their awareness of how to be kind and enjoyed sharing their ambitions in life. We continue to support the children to keep

their bodies healthy through exercise and drinking water.













In literacy, the children continue to develop their writing skills by creating maps, roads and drawings. The children created their very own books using 'That's not my Robot' for inspiration and were able to read their stories to each other. The children have been enjoying role play to develop their storytelling skills.







In Numeracy and Maths, the children have been exploring capacity by filling and pouring. They have created patterns using their fine motor skills and continue to explore number through our weekly learning.

We have undertaken a lot of work to regenerate our outdoor space and a big thank you to everyone who helped with repairs and donations. The children have

loved exploring the new learning areas and using their imagination to create games and stories in their play. They have enjoyed using their maths skills to create potions and recipes in the mud kitchen.



We continue to focus on developing our STEM skills in the ELC. The children have created models that have movement and have used their skills outdoors to create obstacle courses that support the development of their gross motor skills.



The children continue to celebrate being part of the wider community by taking part in activities with the primary school and in the village. They created messy art to support Comic Relief, participated in Shinty lessons with Doreen and celebrated World Book Day. Bookbug continues to visit the ELC to support the development of literacy skills and the children used their singing skills to participate in the Easter service.
